


Age-Friendly Caledon Survey Results

This report provides the summary of findings from a survey implemented under the Age Friendly Caledon initiative. The survey was delivered online, targeted at residents of Caledon aged 55+. Hard copies of the survey were delivered to over 200 households through key community service providers such as Meals on Wheels and Caledon Community Services.

The survey was conducted during the period November 1 to December 1, 2020. The survey was initiated by 300 individuals. The results included in this package provide the insights of those who **completed** the survey **(n=238)**.



Q1 - Are you a resident of the Town of Caledon?




Q2 - In what part of Caledon do you live?








Q3 - What is your age?








Q4 - Do you "feel" your age? (Please select the response that best reflects how you feel compared to your age)








Q5 - When describing yourself to others, which term do you prefer?








Q6- What is your gender?







Q7 - What is your current employment status?






Q8 - What is your annual household income? (household income includes wages, salary, commissions, pension, RSP, CPP, OAS, rental income, investment income, etc.)







Q9 - What is the highest level of education you achieved?






Q10 - How many times per day do you typically leave your home to travel somewhere else?







Q11 - What is your primary mode of transportation within Caledon?





More enforcement for drivers that speed or drive recklessly or don't obey driving rules of the road.

My only comment would be to get BRAMPTON truck drivers OFF our roads to make them safer for all our community!!

The way GTA is providing special services for seniors, Caledon needs to offer such services, especially those who are living in Farmhouses.

Losing the "go" bus was a big blow. Most people didn't even know how easy it was to go downtown Toronto when it was running - went from Bolton to the Go train and right downtown - it was great. Anyone you talk to is surprised to hear about it. It wasn't advertised but the "Go" sign is still attached at the new crosswalk on the corner of Hickman and Hwy 50. Sad. The new service appears quite useless

Make them inexpensive and more readily available

Paving the Caledon Trailway within the villages for better access to year-round use by mobility devices. More paved shoulders on roads making safer to walk or ride bike

live in rural Caledon therefore questions about Bolton transit, parking etc. do not apply. Why not ask questions like if I would like my road paved which would make it easier to take walks, ride a bike to stay fit.

Busing between the different communities. For example, between Bolton and Caledon East.

Transportation - availability and options not all known.

North hill makes it a challenge for those of us over 75 to walk downtown and back up the hill. hard to access shopping without a car/

I am still able to drive myself so I don't know what facilities we have now

Town needs to develop a public system for older adults, persons with disabilities and youth that is flexible and cheap.

We live in a rural area in north west Caledon. We are on our own. Pretty much neglected in every way.

Enforcing the speed limits on the rural roads. We have drivers racing by with the gravel and dirt flying. Quite often you have to scramble into the ditch.

Increased buses for CCS so that they don't have to pick up so many people enroute in one bus, making my trip longer than it would normally be door to door.

More transportation options are required

Passenger train service

A public transportation van, going on fixed schedule within Peel, and which will also include Erin and Orangeville. Note: Belfountain should be included in the route and not just the big towns of Caledon.

We need transportation to the closest GO train station (Malton) so we can get in and out of the city easily for appointments. Bolton line is a joke. It is of no value to the residents of Bolton and serves the warehouse area only.

CCS has a great transportation service.

Bring in an Uber Partnership program like Innisfil Township. This program gives point to point transportation covering 24 hours. There would be no requirement for Caledon to have buses or employees and residents would have access whenever it was required to travel to anywhere in Caledon as opposed to buses which can only follow a route.

More accessible parking spots and more staff checking them. Many times, I have encountered people using them with either a sticker that was not theirs or expired or don't have one.

Do not use

Public transit within Caledon, as well as into other communities, such as Brampton, Mississauga and Toronto is not acceptable. We have rail lines that go into Toronto. Why don't we have frequent rail service in and out of Toronto? Outside of the time of COVID, my spouse and I would love to take public transit to out Sunday afternoon opera in Toronto, or to plays and concerts in the evening in Toronto, Brampton and Mississauga. There is no public transit to Orangeville.

I don't find the Town of Caledon Accessibility for those with walkers and wheelchairs as good as it could be.

Busing at designated times

There are too many signs in Caledon village & not enough enforcement 24/7.OPP.MTO.Caledon by law enforcement officers. Examples 1-Engine breaking why are east bound trucks using engine breaking at Maplegrove if they followed speed limits from Heart Lake Rd 2-No Parking signs between Hwy 10 & Meadow Dr. (trucks constantly park there to go for coffee).

More bike paths

Walking/cycling lanes along side roads

Public transit is lacking. Bus 38 to downtown does not offer good schedules. Too many trucks. Noise pollution

That's tough. Caledon is a huge geographical area. It would be great if there was more Uber in Caledon. Taxis are ridiculously expensive. Perhaps a town minivan or bus that can take people to specific stores on specific days, much like the Ikea bus from Union station





Taxi service is my plan for when I am no longer able to drive. However, there are none near Caledon East or Mono Mills

A bus route on Kennedy to take into the village or Orangeville. Reliable internet.

Not at this time. How about building a couple of adult living communities?

Right now, I don't know what it will be like when I no longer drive. I have no experience what it is like using the bus to go shopping etc.

Caledon Village has no sidewalks so walking on the road can be hazardous.

Subsidized taxi service with many providers. There is no reliable way for seniors to get about. CCS requires planning days ahead and can't be used for thongs like going to church, library, grocery stores etc. Perhaps younger seniors who are still driving could be employed by the Town to drive older seniors around.

Volunteer carpooling (that is not a ride-hailing service).

Trips to other small towns within Caledon

Would love to see some sort of public transit come into Caledon East. Not have to drive to Mayfield to get a bus to Brampton or Toronto

SOME TYPE OF BUS SERVICE WOULD HELP MANY SENIORS

We still need more GO service (or other public transportation) from all parts of Bolton and Palgrave (and other parts of Caledon) to get in and out of Toronto for appointments and/or work. Not everyone has a car or can drive as they get older.

The CCS transportation service is excellent.

Uber Access

Paved shoulders on rural roads to allow those of us who like to walk or ride a bike safe passage along those roads.

Encourage Uber, lyft etc. to be sponsored or subsidized by the town to help out in Caledon east and the likes for seniors on unplanned needs for transportation.

Small bus service on a schedule to include Orangeville and Brampton. We also need some sort of service for visits to hospitals and specialists in other areas including Toronto

Community mobilization such as ride shares network using social media to connect to rides Older adults are often running errands alone-why not pick up a couple of neighbours on your way to get groceries, post office, pharmacy or Walmart?

I would like to cycle or walk within the town of Caledon East more often however I have already brought to the attention of the transportation department in Caledon an issue with some of the designated cycling routes that they have. For safety, if there are more paths to connect the different areas of Caledon East, I would cycle more. Also there is a lack of bicycle racks within the town at various locations including businesses.





We live on the North Hill, would be nice if there was a place near where I could ride my bicycle or walk to get a loaf of bread, can't do the hills on my bike anymore, have to use the car, Caledon prides itself as a green community, maybe not so much as far as a walking/cycling community, you have been talking about a strip mall on the North Hill for 40 years, there are talkers and there are doers, start doing.

Irrelevant to rural areas. As usual, all the Town cares about is keeping Bolton happy

There is no transportation in Palgrave

No system for rural areas of Caledon.

Because I don't live in Bolton, there are almost zero options for Me in for transit other than driving myself or Uber. There are no taxis here - they have to come from Orangeville and charge extra just for coming to pick up in Caledon. Once I cannot drive, I will absolutely leave Caledon. There are no buses, no sidewalks and way, way too much traffic in Caledon Village. No place for seniors at all.

There is no public transportation. No Uber... no taxi... we are forced to drive. No means to join areas of Caledon.

Provide better options to the north west

Special reduced rates for older adults as exhibited in other communities. I'm not aware if we have in Caledon but would welcome uber etc.

Maybe more frequent transportation (buses into the city) or to Subway in Vaughan

This is not a need for our home yet.






Q14 - What type of dwelling do you live in?






Q15 - Including yourself, how many people live in your household?







Q16 - Who do you currently live with? (Please select all responses that apply)






Q17 - How many years have you lived in your current home?








Q18- Do you anticipate moving from your current home within the next 3 - 5 years?







Q19 - Why do you anticipate moving within the next 3 - 5 years? (Please select all responses that apply)





Peel Region have accepted a 20-acre site for a future urgent care facility as well as room for seniors housing very close to us and I hope the town will stop fighting this opportunity.

should be apartment buildings so someone could rent

more affordable places like the Glasgow building

Small, independent living spaces - smaller houses or small apartment buildings

OFFER MORE BUNGALOWS and/or MAYBE MORE GATED COMMUNITIES Links, bungalows.

More senior's retirement homes/centers

Older adults would benefit from smaller, affordable, bungalow style housing in adult-oriented neighborhoods

I would like to see "shared housing " options - so that compatible adults could choose to share housing even if not related by marriage etc. For example, I might choose to add my sister to our living unit, and it would be nice if there was housing available that could accommodate separated areas so she could have her space and we, ours, with common spaces such as kitchen, dining and living areas

Rural Caledon right now does not have any good housing options. We live on a sideroad and there are cars causing disturbances day and night, even into the early morning hours. There are signs posted that there is NO STOPPING in the area, but they are not enforced. We also have an idling by-law





but that is not enforced, either. In the summer months, the cars were idling anywhere from 15 minutes to an hour and a half, to keep the air conditioning on. Now in the winter months, they are idling for about the same time but it is to keep the heater on. The racing by-law is not enforced which makes it difficult for some seniors in the area going for a walk. They are scared that they will be run over. With the constant illegal parking there is a lot of noise and it is difficult to get a good night's sleep, since some of the illegal parkers do not leave till 1:30 a.m. There is also a noise by-law, which is not enforced. All the by-laws are there but they are not enforced so living in rural Caledon is making it very difficult for seniors. No type of housing would solve these issues, unless the by-laws were enforced by the Town of Caledon or the OPP.

I would like a WaterMark (Orangeville) type of subdivision situated in north Caledon in the country with affordable small single family open concept type homes

Caledon subdivisions do not allow for any desirable bungalow options on both smaller and larger lots.

There are not really many options in Caledon. We are looking at a new home on one level near / with an indoor swimming pool and with transportation options to enable us to go to doctors/ dentist/ grocery shopping if we can't drive. Price is also a factor as we would like to invest some proceeds of our home.

Retirement homes one level small townhomes

Build affordable bungalows in Bolton, seniors that I know would like to downsize. Being empty nesters in detached homes that are now too big. We would like to stay in our own home, not an overpriced retirement place.

Build more assisted living apartments. Many seniors are capable of being in their own living space with some assistance.

Smaller independent houses that seniors could own. If I feel the need to move to something smaller, I don't want to move to a condo or a "retirement living" facility.

Some senior apartments. Not everyone wants to purchase a condo or can afford Sorrento.

Affordable housing

Subdivisions with mix of housing which caters to all ages so that it would be possible to transition from young adult to old age by moving through the various age suitable types of housing while staying in the same neighborhood.

More affordable housing not just for seniors but the disabled.

Affordable

Need more senior apartments and nursing homes

Need to have an option to have affordable bungalows to purchase. Looked at sizing down in the area and it is very expensive. Like options to be in north Caledon.

Without better transit to Toronto, closer hospitals, and better public transit for local shopping, my spouse and I will have to move if driving is no longer an option for us. If stairs become a barrier for us, we will have to move elsewhere, and there are still very few accessible houses and apartments in Bolton. If we need support, we will probably want to move closer to our daughter and family currently in Waterloo.





We need to increase housing that is one level, more bungalows. Also, a seniors living housing towards the West side of Caledon as I know we have one in Bolton. Bolton is our largest town, so we focus on it, we need to look at the balance of the Town of Caledon

More affordable apartments, I need to stay where I am as I cannot afford to move out. The waiting list for the low income seniors apartments is years

Access to resources to help with renovations and outdoor yardwork

Caledon needs bungalow style townhomes or linked homes. Seniors need 1 storey housing.

Need more senior dedicated options that are more affordable

Considering the problem of scarcity of transport, seniors' buildings should be close to stores, medical buildings, bank, restaurants etc. not near the edge of town. A great example is the Lord Dufferin Centre in Orangeville.

We are looking for a nice place to rent in Bolton for 2400 all in. We are selling our large home in Bolton and want to downsize so we can semi-retire. It's looking like we may have to move to Alliston which is very sad. We'd stay in Caledon if we could find what we're looking for.





Bungalows, bungalofts, small-home bungalows, renovating old farmhouses and other heritage homes into seniors' residences.

I read recently there are proposed senior residences in this area. 3 story town houses —— that's ridiculous. They should be building bungalows. A lot of seniors can't handle stairs. 3 story town houses are just greedy builders refusing to provide practical safe housing because these structures take up more land and they make less revenue.

Affordable one store detached homes.

Not so expensive and availability for those that can't afford it

Greater down-sizing possibilities (condominiums or apartments) would allow seniors to move within the area.

Less expensive housing. Most elderly people can't afford what is available. Also, less condos and more rentals.

There should be more affordable bungalows and/or rental apartments. The existing retirement homes and condos are priced out of reach for seniors wanting to stay in their own town.

Apartment buildings where people can live for less than 4,000-6,000. (Sorrento). Or need to purchase a condominium for 500,00-600,00. For some reason this town cannot build apartment buildings. You want to enhance the downtown area (hasn't happened in 50 years) perhaps increasing the population density with affordable apartments and people could walk to restaurants etc.

More senior apartment buildings

Affordable senior residences to downsize (Florida style senior communities), low rise senior rental/condos, affordable long term care old age residences.

It would be helpful to have another community like Legacy Pines in Palgrave. These two communities should have a medical centre which one or two doctors and or other medical staff would be there one or two days a week. There should also be a facility where bye residents are provided with transportation to and from medical related appointments like dental, physiotherapy etc.

Senior housing is very limited in Caledon East, we have just one facility with a very long waiting list. The majority of seniors do not buy the million-dollar homes that are being built, they are downsizing, but we cannot stay in Caledon East we have to move away which is not necessarily what we want to do.

absolutely! So many seniors wish to stay in the small hamlets of Caledon yet there are no small bungalows (<1200 sq ft total) with access to own green space/garden. Perhaps small garden apartments? Certainly not multilevel townhouses all crowded to gather.

I have an in-law suite in my daughter and son in law 's home. This is ideal as I help them with the children and they help me, particularly during a pandemic. I think Caledon should encourage in-law suites and home care for those who need it. This is particularly important with the horrible state of long-term care homes.

More affordable retirement housing






Q23 - What reasons influenced your decision NOT to participate in social, leisure and/or recreational activities in Caledon? (Please select all responses that apply)







Q24 - Prior to COVID-19, where did you go to participate in social, leisure and/or recreational activities? (Please select all responses that apply)






Q25 - What are the most convenient times for you to participate in social, leisure and/or recreational activities? (Please select all that apply)








Q26 - Do you prefer programs scheduled on weekdays or weekends?








Q27 - How many hours per week do you typically spend participating in social, leisure and/or recreational activities?








Q28 - During the next 3-5 years, how do you expect your social, leisure and/or recreational activity to change?









This is discriminating against most seniors who cannot afford electric cars & no it is not cheaper unless you can keep it for a lot of years

Unfortunately, most seniors prefer to stay at home

CCS Improve transportation services. Too restrictive especially on weekends

Continue to work on improving communication about all events and programs existing, new and upcoming

When one lives in the west end of town, travelling to activities is a long distance and as such limits one participation.

Send emails regularly with a listing of upcoming activities.

Expand Rotary Place. Space is limited.

Pool in Caledon village. And don't say our numbers don't merit. Two pools on Mayfield's border I bet are well used by new residents and Brampton people living 5 min away. But 20 or 30 plus year residents in ward 1 can pay taxes and drive farther.

Reduce the cost of membership in the wellness centre for seniors. When I retired a number of years ago, I wanted to join a fitness Centre. At that time, the City of Brampton membership fees were considerably lower than Caledon's, so I joined in Brampton and have been a member ever since. Parks and recreations web site if both complicated and frustrating. The price of the activities (eg the Wellness Centre) is too expensive for many seniors. There should be more transport to activities for those who don't have access to transportation to be able to get to the programs. I belong to the senior's program through CCAC. The wait times to get into the program are too long they really need To have more exercise programs and also have more targeted groups depending on the individuals level of physical abilities.

The Caledon Seniors' Centre could do a community listing in the local papers once in a while. Newcomers probably wouldn't even know they are here unless they meet someone who goes there, especially since the participation age is 55+.

To get admitted into a fitness program at the Senior Centre (not run by the centre) the wait time is 6-8 months. Then you are permitted one class per week. This has been happening for years. You do not need a survey to tell you this is not a great situation.

Perhaps your focus might be on enticing the smaller community within the community i.e hamlets, upper lower middle Bolton, to take care of their own. 


Q32 - How would you describe your sense of community belonging?








Q33 - Do you feel that your opinions are valued in the Town of Caledon?








Q34 - Do you feel that the diverse needs of older adults are well understood by municipal staff and elected officials in the Town of Caledon?








Q35 - Do you feel that the contributions of older adults in the community are appropriately recognized by municipal staff and elected officials in the Town of Caledon?







Q36 - Do you tend to agree or disagree with the following statements regarding respect and social inclusion for older adults in Caledon?








Q38 - How many hours per week do you dedicate to volunteer activities?



Q40 - Do you tend to agree or disagree with following statements regarding civic participation and employment opportunities for older adults in the Town of Caledon?







Q42 - What is your <u>preferred</u> method of staying informed about programs and services for older adults in the Town of Caledon? (Please select only one response)





Q43 - Do you tend to agree or disagree with following statements regarding communication and information about programs and services for older adults in the Town of Caledon?






Q44 - In general, how would you describe your physical health?








Q45 - In general, how would you describe your mental health and personal well-being?








Q46 - Do you act as a caregiver for an older adult spouse, family member or friend in the Town of Caledon?







Q47 - Do you tend to agree or disagree with the following statements regarding community support and health services for older adults in the Town of Caledon?




