## **RE:** A Municipal Charter for Watershed Security can help with Caledon's Official Plan, 12 Bylaws, Aggregate Review, and more

## Developing a Municipal Charter for Watershed Security

As Ontario municipalities deliver core services that impact watershed security, including land use permitting and infrastructure to manage drinking water, storm water, and sanitary sewage, and as Ontario's population and development pressures grow at a time the climate and biodiversity crises require strategic direction, it is more important than ever that municipalities integrate land use and watershed planning.

As a first step along this path, the OHI suggests that municipalities develop a Charter for Watershed Security to protect public health, social wellbeing, and economic vitality, or similar high-level commitment, by integrating land use and watershed planning.

The charter and/or subsequent supporting initiatives could have the following elements:

- A commitment to safeguard watershed security by integrating land use and watershed planning;
- Taking a whole watershed approach by collaborating with both upstream municipalities to secure normal flows of clean water entering the municipality as well as with downstream municipalities to assure them of the same;
- A mandate for all or specific departments, such as economic development, permitting, transportation, and works, to integrate their land use planning responsibilities with watershed planning, with specific objectives for mitigating and adapting to a changing climate;
- Undertaking both an ecological land classification system and a water resource inventory and using the information to create both a natural heritage system strategy and a biodiversity strategy to identify and protect key ecological features and functions for local watershed health;
- Establishing watershed and/or sub-watershed targets, including restoration targets where necessary, for areas in natural heritage, wetlands, streamside vegetation, and urban canopies and greenspace;
- Ensuring before and after terrestrial and aquatic monitoring of the immediate impact of specific development, including infrastructure, as decided by a municipal protocol;
- Performing cumulative monitoring on a regular basis and implementing adaptive management to redress unacceptable conditions, and,
- Encouraging sound stewardship practices for all land in the municipality.
